COLLABRATIVE LEARNING

We have started a new initiative around encouraging collaborative learning in our lessons. We would like to give the students more opportunities to work in pairs and groups in order to improve their engagement in lessons and ensure that their understanding of the topics is excellent. All students are sitting in pairs or groups which will support their learning and we are using a questioning technique called 'Think, Pair, Share' which gives the students time to think about their responses, then share them with their partner before the teacher asks for answers from the whole class. The aim of this is to ensure that the teachers can check the understanding of as many students as possible and to allow all the students to participate. Finally, we are asking students to really think about how they listen to each other. We have explored the fact that listening is much more than simply hearing what is being said but it also requires us to give our undivided attention to the speaker and if possible to look at the speaker as well. This is something we will be looking out for and praising in lessons. We will be introducing more and more collaboration as the year progresses.

YOUNG GUNZ ACADEMY

14 students from the Academy have signed up for a 6-week block of Strength and Conditioning Work at Core Fit, Consett.

The students will be working with strength and conditioning coaches to improve form and fitness and to improve their overall wellbeing and sports performance.


